You decorated, traveled, ate, open gifts, and ate some more. You rang in the new year with a long list of resolutions and a plate full of collard greens and black-eyed peas. Now, what?

Epiphany: It's time to take down all the decorations.

Many people have only heard of Twelfth Night or Epiphany as the deadline for taking down Christmas decorations, but it's actually a significant part of Christian history.

What is the history behind this holiday?

The word epiphany means "manifestation" or "revelation." When Christians talk about Epiphany, we are referring to the three wise men or the Magi's revelation that Jesus was the Christ, the Messiah that Israel had been waiting for (Matthew 2:1-12). On this day, we recognize the wise men's journey to see, worship, and bring gifts to "the one...born king of the Jews" (Matthew 2:2). The festival commemorating Epiphany is Jan. 6 and is also called Three Kings. Epiphany celebrates Jesus' outward and visible expression of love for us.

Why does the Epiphany matter?

Christ's birth was a big deal for the wise men, and it is a big deal for us. At its essence, Epiphany celebrates Jesus' outward and visible expression of love in leaving His rightful place in heaven to live as a human and become the sacrifice for our sins. The Magi, wise men who studied the stars and were considered sinners, represent Jesus' ability to draw all types of people to Him. He is a Savior who came for all people, including each one of us.

Should I celebrate Epiphany? And if so, how?

Epiphany traditions vary from culture to culture. It can be helpful to remember and celebrate significant events in Jesus' life, including the Epiphany. What is important to keep in mind when celebrating any holiday is the reason for and the heart behind the celebration. Rather than acknowledging traditions or rituals because they've always been done, celebrate the meaning of the holiday: Jesus came to earth to save us.

A Story About Racial Justice: Marching with our Feet


Rev. Anthony Williams, pastor of MLK Community Church, is the father of a son, Nehemiah, who died by gun violence in 2019 and he is doing all he can to stop such pain from reaching other families. Pastor Williams has been on a mission for years pushing elected officials to declare violence as a public health crisis. He accomplished that goal at the state level. Governor Pritzker signed a bill in April that directs more resources to communities impacted by violence.

Now Pastor Williams is calling on President Biden to issue an executive order declaring violence as a public health crisis. He and others started out on June 23, 2021 walking from Chicago to Washington, DC to press his point. They arrived in DC on July 4th where Pastor Williams delivered an address at the Martin Luther King, Jr. national monument.

This past summer, General Synod 32 overwhelmingly passed: "Nehemiah's Life: A Call for Congressional Hearings on Violence in America," a Resolution of Witness.

Every day 316 people are shot in this country and 106 of them die from gun violence!

Message from the Moderator....



As I write this month's message the world is bracing for the next wave of COVID-19, fueled by the Omicron variant. As you may know this is a rapidly spreading variant that can cause hospitalization and possibly death in unvaccinated persons. There is still much to learn about Omicron, but in this early stage it also appears to infect vaccinated persons, although with milder symptoms. To slow transmission of the disease, California has reinstituted the requirement to wear masks indoors in public places. Although this requirement does not apply to churches,

the Deacons recommended and the Cabinet agreed that the ACC will continue to require masks for everyone at all indoor gatherings, regardless of vaccination status.

Although we all look forward to the day COVID-19 is tamed, we need to recognize that this disease may be around for a long time. What does that mean for the future of our congregation? This will be the primary topic of discussion at our Annual Meeting on January 30, 2022. In a departure from previous years, we will not read annual reports from the various boards, they will only be printed in the hand-out. Instead, we invite you to participate in an interactive discussion aimed at visualizing how the church will adapt to life with COVID and the changing needs of our community. How will we approach our mission to "minister to the needs of our congregation and community" in 2022 and beyond? We hope you will join us to help chart our future course through these uncertain times. The Annual Meeting will be on Sunday, January 30, 2022, following the 9:00 AM Worship Service.


You Will Be Found
