Father's Day



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The campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers did not meet with the same enthusiasm-perhaps because, as one florist explained, "fathers haven't the same sentimental appeal that mothers have."

On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who

had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday.


The next year, a Spokane, Washington, woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

Slowly, the holiday spread. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day.

Today, the day honoring fathers is celebrated in the United States on the third Sunday of June: Father's Day 2022 occurs on June 19.

65th Anniversary of the UCC

The late Rev. Dr. Louis H. Gunnemann, wrote a compelling story of how the United Church of Christ took shape in the mid-twentieth century in his book, **The Shaping of the UCC**. Dr. Gunnemann was Dean of United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities in New Brighton, Minn. During this time, church unions were a prominent feature of the movement toward Christian unity and secular models of organization dominated denominational development. Today the United Church of Christ has grown into a denomination that strives to become a multicultural and multiracial church.

The UCC was formed at the General Synod in 1957 in Cleveland, OH., a merger of four denominations: Congregational, Christian, Evangelical, and Reformed. Alpine Community Church started as a Congregational Church, but became a United Church of Christ. The UCC was the first denomination to ordain a women and an opening gay man and woman. Today, the UCC is indeed a multicultural and multiracial church. It is known as a progressive Christian Church. For some, the name "progressive" means "liberal". However, most of the members of the UCC are rather traditional.

The UCC believes in the triune God: Creator, resurrected Christ, the sole Head of the church, and the Holy Spirit, who guides and brings about the creative and redemptive work of God in the world. The UCC believes that each person is unique and valuable. It is the will of God that every person belongs to a family of faith where they have a strong sense of being valued and loved.

The UCC believes that each person is on a spiritual journey and that each of us is at a different stage of that journey.

The UCC believes that the persistent search for God produces an authentic relationship with God, engendering love, strengthening faith, dissolving guilt, and giving life purpose and direction. The UCC believes that all of the baptized 'belong body and soul to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.' No matter who – no matter what – no matter where we are on life's journey – notwithstanding race, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, class or creed – we all belong to God and to one worldwide community of faith. All persons baptized – past, present and future – are connected to each other and to God through the sacrament of baptism. We baptize during worship when the community is present because baptism includes the community's promise of 'love, support and care' for the baptized – and we promise that we won't take it back – no matter where your journey leads you.

The UCC believes that all people of faith are invited to join Christ at Christ's table for the sacrament of Communion. Just as many grains of wheat are gathered to make one loaf of bread and many grapes are gathered to make one cup of wine, we, the many people of God, are made one in the body of Christ, the church. The breaking of bread and the pouring of wine reminds us of the costliness of Christ's sacrifice and the discipleship to which we are all called. In the breaking of bread, we remember and celebrate Christ's presence among us along with a 'cloud of witnesses' – our ancestors, family and friends who have gone before us. It is a great mystery; we claim it by faith.

Message from the Moderator....



This month we bid a fond farewell and send our very best wishes to Pastor Ken and Tracy Colman as they return to Washington State. Ken's last day preaching is Sunday, June 12, and they depart for Washington shortly thereafter. We will keep them in our prayers for a safe journey and remember them fondly in prayers of thanksgiving for their leadership during their five years in Alpine.

The process for finding a part-time interim pastor is underway, but it will not be swift. In early May, the Interim Search Committee met by Zoom conference with Kris Bergstrom, the acting conference minister for the UCC Southern California Nevada Conference. Kris will be a very helpful resource and guide through the search process. One thing she emphasized is that churches need to have a Mission and Purpose in order to survive. Furthermore, we must embrace

and act upon our Mission as individuals and as a Congregation. What is the Mission of the Alpine Community Church? During the first service every month, we recite our mission statement together: Our Mission as the Alpine Community Church is to serve God by creating an environment of fellowship following the teachings of Jesus Christ. We minister to the needs of our congregation and community, motivating ourselves with love, faith, and hope.

In order to embrace and act upon our Mission we need to do more than recite it in church. We need to live it, feel it, own it. Following are some examples of how we currently engage in our mission.

The Blessing Box in front of the church offers free food & sundries to whoever has a need. Members of the church and the Alpine community donate items to the Blessing Box. We started the project before COVID-19 and it is a great success, with uncounted numbers of canned and packaged goods going to people who really need help.

The Harvey Medical Shed offers the free use of medical equipment such as canes, crutches, walkers, toilet seats, and wheelchairs.

At Thanksgiving, the Deacons receive offerings of food and cash, which they use to prepare and distribute Thanksgiving food baskets to neighbors in need.

At Christmas, we provide gifts for the Angel Tree that are distributed by the Deacons to children of families who can not otherwise afford gifts.

Our annual rummage sale is perhaps the largest mission event of the year. Each year our church volunteers spend hundreds of hours receiving, sorting, and organizing all kinds of clothing and items too good to throw away. We sell items to the public at below Thrift Store prices, making it possible for families in need to afford gently used household essentials and clothes for growing children. The Guild raises money throughout the year, which they donate to worthy charities serving people in need throughout greater San Diego.

Some members of our church volunteer at the Alpine Community Center or Meals-on-Wheels, others call or visit with shut-ins.

What role do you play in supporting these missions? Do you volunteer time to organize or work on the projects, donate food or other gifts, or help distribute these items? Every time you lend a hand, you are contributing to our mission by "ministering to the needs of our congregation and community with love, faith, and hope".
