Who is The United Church of Christ?

As we move toward welcoming a new settled Pastor for our church, it's very important that we all understand the United Church of Christ as our denomination. Over the years, we have had a variety of Pastor that came from other denominations. I believe this has clouded our understanding of who we are a a UCC congregation. Therefore, I offer this article on "Who is the United Church of Christ?"

Since 1957, the United Church of Christ has been the church of firsts, weaving God's message of hope and extravagant welcome with action for justice and peace. Together, we live out our faith in ways that effect change in our communities. The UCC's many "firsts" mean that we have inherited a tradition of acting upon the demands of our faith. When we read in Galatians: "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus"—a demand is made upon all of us. And so we were the first historically white denomination to ordain an African-American, the first to ordain a woman, the first to ordain an openly gay man, and the first Christian church to affirm the right of same-gender couples to marry. We were in the forefront of the anti-slavery movement and the Civil Rights movement. Our response to the demands of our faith is woven into the history of our country.

Today, we continue to change lives throughout the world. We work alongside more than 200 mission partners. We labor ceaselessly to fight injustice, in the United States and abroad. We instill our vision into our youth and young adults, forging leaders who will imagine new dreams. And we sustain and develop church leaders, pastors, and our local churches to live their faith in exciting new ways. We believe in a God that is still speaking, a God that is all-loving and inclusive. We are a church that welcomes and accepts everyone as they are, where your mind is nourished as much as your soul. We are a church where Jesus the healer meets Jesus the revolutionary, and where together, we grow a just and peaceful world!

Message from the Moderator...



The search continues for our next Pastor. We initially thought we would call an Intentional Interim Pastor, and later, another search committee would call a Settled Pastor. However, in one of our frequent meetings with Rev. Kris Bergstrom of the UCC Southern California, Nevada Conference (SCNC), Rev. Bergstrom suggested that instead we attempt to call a Designated Term Pastor. The advantage to a small church like ours is that the Designated Term Pastor can be converted to a Settled Pastor at completion of the term without going through an additional search process. We liked this idea, but needed to get

Congregation approval of an addendum to the by-laws to allow this new procedure for the ACC. A meeting was called for July 10, and the members in attendance unanimously approved the Addendum, which is printed elsewhere in this newsletter.

So now, let me share with you the activities of the "Designated Term Committee". First we have met several times with the SCNC to learn the procedures for searching for our next Pastor. We have studied the requirements and at our meeting on July 10, we asked the Congregation to rank the most essential and desirable things our next pastor will do. Your input in this area is vital and we are now working to incorporate the responses of the Congregation into the description of duties for the next Pastor. This is particularly important for ACC because we are a small church that is unable to afford a full-time Settled Pastor.

Since the middle of June, we have welcomed a very different Pastor each week to preach the Sunday sermon. (*I offer a special thanks to Sandy Lusink for arranging and scheduling the wide variety of visiting pastors*). The great thing about this is that we have experienced very different sermon types and it offered a chance to get more input from the congregation. So at the July 10 meeting, we asked the members present to tell us about each sermon, i.e. did you like one sermon style or content more than another? The response was generally consistent among all in the congregation as to the type of sermon they preferred, and we will take that in consideration during the candidate reviews.

On one hand, it sometimes feels like we have been working at this for months, but the reality is that we have just been working at it for five or six weeks. We feel like we are making good progress and we are grateful to the Congregation for all your support and suggestions. Your input is what will make this a success.

I want to thank the members of the church who are serving on this **Designated Term Committee**, each person is working countless hours each week on this project. So, if you want to make any suggestions, have questions, or want to thank anyone for their work, here are the names of our committee members: Peggy Barnum, Doreen Caldwell, Sandy Lusink, Barbara Nelson, Bruce Nelson, Judy Myers, Ray Sopfe, and Tom Myers.

Proposed Addendum to ACC By-laws

Section 3 Addendum: Designated Term Committee

- A. Designated-Term Ministry is a call to serve the church for an established length of time (typically 6 months to 1 year). Designated Term ministry is similar to an interim pastor, but has the advantage that, the Designated Term Pastor can be called to become the settled pastor.
- B. The Designated Term Committee shall consist of five (5) to nine (9) members including the Moderator, chairpersons or delegates from the Board of Deacons, Trustees and Education, a representative from the Guild, and up to four persons-at-large elected by the Cabinet representing a cross-section of the membership.
- C. The Designated Term Committee shall:
 - 1. Work closely with the United Church of Christ Conference staff and follow procedures the Conference staff has found effective in the search for a new pastor.
 - 2. Prepare, with input from the Congregation, the church profile describing the Alpine UCC congregation and Alpine community.
 - 3. Study the criteria for selection of a new pastor.
- + 4. Review applicants in terms of the established criteria.
 - 5. Handle correspondence with the Conference and applicants, arrange meetings and interviews, and do whatever else is necessary to find and hire a Designated Term pastor.
- D. The Designated Term Committee shall keep the congregation informed of its progress at important milestones. Discussions and decisions by the Designated Term Committee shall be confidential, with the exception of reports made to the congregation.
- E. The Designated Term Committee shall select a Designated Term Pastor to conduct regular worship and to perform pastoral services for a specified length of time. At any time, the Designated Term Committee may call for a meeting and vote of the Congregation to convert the incumbent Designated Term Pastor to the position of Settled Pastor. If the Congregation does not approve this candidate, the Designated Term Committee shall find and recommend another candidate.
- F. The Designated Term Committee has authority to release the Designated Term Pastor with proper notice in accordance with the Designated Term Call Agreement.
