HOLY WEEK: 8 DAYS THAT CHANGED THE WORLD

Holy Week is a string of eight days that allow us an opportunity to reflect upon the shift in humanity Jesus' sacrifice on the cross launched. It starts with Palm Sunday when Jesus enters the city of Jerusalem. The week leads us through the Last Supper, His crucifixion, and ends on Easter Sunday with His resurrection. This is the basis of Christianity, His sacrifice launched the New Covenant God promised

and many had prophesied throughout the Old Testament. Each day of Holy Week allows us to peek into the heart of our Savior at intently close proximity His love for us is reflected in every significant step toward the cross, every breath up to the last, and His resurrection.

How Holy Week Leads to Easter Sunday

Though Jesus didn't walk the earth incarnate until He was born in Bethlehem to Mary and Joseph, He exists and works throughout the entirety of the Bible. Scripture assures us that He was present at Creation with the Father, that He is the Word, and many prophecies were fulfilled explicitly during this final, holy week of Jesus' life on earth. Each Gospel has a narrative of the last week of Jesus' life (Matthew 21-28; Mark 11-16; Luke 19-24; John 12-21).

What Is Holy Week?

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday and ends on Easter Sunday. During this one week, many biblical prophesies were fulfilled. Jesus came to earth to save humanity by dying on the cross on Good Friday and resurrecting on Easter Sunday. By enduring and defeating death sacrificially for us, He swung open the gates of heaven, allowing our sins to be forgiven and ushering us into the presence of God (Romans 5:8).

Due to the sinful nature of humanity as a result of Adam and Eve's fall in the garden of Eden, it's impossible for us to be "good enough" to be in the presence of God and forgiven for our sins. Jesus died to make the way for salvation. The Old Testament Law offered many sacrifices to God, but Jesus was the perfect atoning sacrifice once and for all. He endured the cross out of His great love for us. Holy Week is a sacred opportunity to study the foundation of Christianity. Our God is not one of coincidence. Every step toward the cross was intentional, every lesson laced with His personal love for all of us.

Operation Christmas Child



200 MILLION BLESSINGS!

By God's grace, Operation Christmas Child reaches a special milestone!

Over the years, the Good News of Jesus Christ has been spread to children in over 175 countries and territories through the gift of a simple shoebox. This year marks the milestone in which the symbolic 200 millionth shoebox has been delivered to a child in need! Years ago, Elizabeth Groff was one of the children who received a shoebox in Ukraine. At a young age she had already experienced a very hard life. Elizabeth's mother turned to alcohol after her father died when she was only one. After her mother gave birth to baby Tanya, Elizabeth became the baby's caretaker. At age 7, Elizabeth knew it was time to take her sister and run away to an orphanage only to become heartbroken when Tanya's father came for Tanya but left Elizabeth. She felt so alone and unloved. It was during this time when she felt that she had hit "rock bottom" and when she felt "broken" that she received her shoebox gift. She said that the shoebox "absolutely changed" her life. When she turned 13, an American family adopted her. Elizabeth said, "I felt alone. I felt lost. That is where Jesus met me. He didn't leave me there. He showed me that He loved and cared for me through a simple gift---through a shoebox." With her new family that first year, she packed 150 Operation Christmas Child gift shoeboxes. She continued to pack shoeboxes in high school and later at Virginia Tech where she headed a 300-member shoebox club on campus. Elizabeth was chosen to deliver the symbolic 200 millionth shoebox. On a bitter cold day in war torn Ukraine at an outreach event that included games, singing, dancing, and the Gospel, Elizabeth delivered the 200 millionth shoebox to orphaned 8-year-old Natalya who became overcome with joy. Millions of children are living in darkness and despair around the world. Thanks to all who have allowed Christ to work thought them to use a simple shoebox gift to bring happiness, hope, and the Greatest Gift of All to the children, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Truly.

I also want to express my gratitude to the trustees, the deacons, the choir, the guild, those who assist and

volunteer with coffee hour, peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, and anything related to the upkeep of this beautiful parish. Last but not least, we, as a church, thank Denise for all of her hard work, as well. I'm so sorry if I have missed anyone. Please charge it to my memory and not my heart.

Over the past few months, Alpine, our community has grown tremendously, and our faith has deepened as we have come together in worship and fellowship and various types of activities. I am so proud of each and every one of you for your unwavering commitment to the church, and for your tireless efforts to support and uplift one another. This is a kind church; it's a kind place. And It brings me great joy to feel so uniquely happy about where we are headed together. And speaking of together, I want to remind us all of some very important special days coming up.

First, in the spirit of interfaith respect and love, I want to remind us all that for the Muslims, Ramadan is coming up. Ramadan is a month-long period of fasting, prayer, and reflection for them. It's long and demanding but it's beautiful. During the month of Ramadan, Muslims fast from dawn until dusk, refraining from food, drink, smoking, and any other unnecessary or unhelpful physical needs. This fasting is intended to help Muslims develop self-discipline, strengthening their relationship with God, and show solidarity and support with all those who are less fortunate. In addition to fasting, Muslims also increase their prayers and engage in acts of charity and kindness during Ramadan. The month concludes with the celebration of Eid al-Fitr, a holiday that marks the end of the fast and is celebrated with feasting, gift-giving, and community gatherings. Ramadan is an extremely important time for Muslims. It's so important and meaningful because it is considered one of the Five Pillars of Islam, along with the declaration of faith, prayer, charity, and the famous pilgrimage to Mecca. It is also a time of spiritual renewal, introspection, and increased devotion to God. As a Christian church, it is important to respect the observance of Ramadan by Muslims, as it is a deeply meaningful and significant time for them. Showing support and understanding

for the practices of other religions is an important aspect of interfaith dialogue and can promote harmony and understanding between different communities.

Now, as it relates to us. We must remember that Easter Sunday is fast approaching. And because of Easter, I am reminded of the incredible power of our faith and the hope that it brings to our lives. This day marks the pinnacle of the Christian calendar, and it is a time of great celebration and joy. The resurrection of Jesus Christ represents a triumph over death and a promise of eternal life, and it is a reminder of the incredible love that God has for each and every one of us. As a Christian church, it is important to honor the significance of Easter as the foundation of the Christian faith, and to use this time to strengthen one's relationship with God and deepen one's understanding of the message of Christ's sacrifice and resurrection.

But I'm also a bit ahead of myself. Because before we get to Easter, we have to get to Maundy Thursday. And we will have a wonderful service on that day, as well. Maundy Thursday is a Christian holy day that is observed on the Thursday before Easter Sunday. It commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ with his disciples, which took place on the night before his crucifixion. Now, the word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandatum," which means commandment, and refers to the commandment that Jesus gave to his disciples at the Last Supper: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another." (John 13:34)

Maundy Thursday is marked by a number of significant traditions in the Christian faith. One of the most important is the washing of the feet, which is a symbolic act of humility and service that Jesus performed for his disciples. Some churches continue this tradition by washing the feet of members of the congregation or of those in need.

Maundy Thursday is also a time of reflection and contemplation on the events of Jesus' last days on earth. Many Christians participate in prayer vigils or attend special services that focus on the themes of

repentance, forgiveness, and sacrifice. Overall, Maundy Thursday is an important day in the Christian calendar, as it marks the beginning of the Easter Triduum, which includes Good Friday and Easter Sunday, and emphasizes the themes of love, service, sacrifice, and forgiveness that are central to the Christian faith.

Last thing, and I know I have yapped and yapped, but please attend the Guild meetings! I, too, will do better. But they are wonderful and the community will benefit. I've kept you too long. What an honor to be the minister.
