Another great activity is visiting the San Diego Zoo, which is wheelchair and stroller-friendly and has over 4,000 animals and 800 species.

For those looking for free activities, Seaport Village is a great place to window shop, wander along the bay, listen to live music, and watch the kites fly. There are also many hiking trails in San Diego that are great for families, including Cowles Mountain, Iron Mountain, and Torrey Pines State Natural Reserve.
