Message from the Moderator....



You've seen the Red and Black hymnals in the pews, have you wondered "What's the difference?" Well aside from the obvious differences of size, color, condition of covers, and old verses new, there is at least one major difference inside. You have probably guessed it: some of the words in several of the songs are different in the black hymnal. This can be confusing, but it is done for a very good reason.

Some of us have grown up with the lyrics printed in the red hymnal. In fact, we have sung the same song and lyrics so often that we don't

need the hymnal to sing along – we know the words by heart. So why in the world would anyone want to change the words?

The hymns in the black covered book, officially titled *The New Century Hymnal*, were compiled by The Pilgrim Press, which takes its name from Elder William Brewster's Pilgrim Press (publishing from 1617-1619 in Leiden, Holland). So, you can see the UCC connection goes back a long way. Although these are based on the same lyrics for songs that date back to the 17th century, the compilers of the new hymnal thought it was time to update the words so that the *New Century Hymnal* reflects the language and social values of the current time, the 21st century. You will notice that in most cases the words you remember are changed to be more inclusive and sometimes archaic words are replaced with more contemporary words. As a result, for those of us who sing familiar, longtime favorite hymns we may stumble on the new words. But when you find this happening, I recommend you try singing the new lyrics and perhaps reviewing the changes later when you have a moment to thoughtfully consider the revision. I think you will see and understand the differences quickly.

Singing hymns is a very important part of our church tradition and I know some folks come to church, at least partly, to enjoy the singing. However, adjusting the language to be more inclusive is a virtue reflected also in other changes that are coming to us in this new century. To attract a younger and more diverse congregation, we need to share the gospel in words and phrases that avoid biases, slang, and expressions that discriminate against groups of people based on race, gender, socioeconomic status, and ability. We can do this!

Starting in November, we will be singing hymns exclusively from *The New Century Hymnal*, the one with a black cover. Let's all embrace the new and inclusive language in this updated compilation of classic hymns and contemporary songs of praise.
