Into Darkness There is Light



I'm writing this on September 11, arguably the worst ever attack on American soil. It was at least the worst attack I have lived to see.

It was very hard for me to find God in the days that followed. However, in the years since the attacks, I have found hope in hearing certain stories that came out of the darkness of that day. One story is from an angel book of mine. I hope that after reading about it, everyone will think about it in the coming years and remember that God's light always shines in the darkness.

Genelle was a young immigrant from Trinidad, who worked as an administrative assistant in the North Tower of the World Trade Center. She had had many ups and downs in life and struggled with

her faith. She believed in God, but lived a party lifestyle that didn't leave room for Him. When her mother died of cancer, she all but turned away from Him completely. Yet, on that fateful day, September 11, she would find herself relying on Him as she had not in many years.

When the second plane hit the South tower, everyone in the office decided to ignore the advice to stay put and started going down the stairs. Genelle held the hand of a friend and descended down counting the steps as she went. When she stopped to take off her shoes, the building collapsed.

As she lay pinned under some debris, she called out to her friend, or anyone who might hear, for help. But she soon realized that she was the only survivor in the area. She did the only thing she knew to do. She prayed to God, hoping that He was still listening.

She spent the night trapped under what was left of the tower. When morning came, she asked God to give her a sign that He was with her. Not long after, she heard a noise as if someone was coming. She called out, and heard a man's voice and he grabbed her hand. He told her he was just ahead of the rescue team and that she was going to be rescued. He said his name was Paul and he promised to stay with her until she was rescued. She tried to look at him but could not open her eyes.

After twenty-six hours trapped underneath the rubble, Genelle was rescued. From that moment on, everything changed for her. She decided to devote her life to God, married the man she had been dating, and joined a church.

At Christmas that year, she was given the opportunity to thank the rescuers who had saved her life. She was especially eager thank Paul. She asked the firemen about him. However, they said they knew everyone who was there that day. No one knew anyone named Paul.

If you do not want to go out and about to shop, you can go online through "Build your shoebox online Operation Christmas Child" and choose items to create your shoebox. There is a \$25 donation for the gift items and processing.

We will join thousands of volunteers of every age, race, denomination, and nationality here in the US and abroad as we put differences aside to join as one to respond to the Great Commission from Jesus: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations... Matthew 28:19." We cannot physically do that, but we can introduce the children of the world to our Lord with the help of a small shoebox filled with hope and love.
