## Message from the Moderator....



I was in the church office recently when an Alpine resident called to ask the dates for the church rummage sale. She said she has some things to donate to the sale. Then she mentioned that she has been shopping at and donating to the rummage sale for nearly 20 years and commented that it is the best rummage sale around and what a blessing it is to people in Alpine who need to purchase items in good condition at very low cost.

That got me thinking about how important this community project is to folks in Alpine. For years we have maintained the lowest prices for

used clothing and household items in the San Diego area. Where else can a family outfit a child with decent school clothes for about twenty dollars? Or buy gently used tools, kitchenware, books, DVD's, toys, shoes, linens, or nick-nacks at bargain prices? We have been able to maintain our very low prices because of the tremendous work of volunteers who help with the sorting, testing, display, and sales of these items.

So, the direct answer to this caller's question is: The Alpine Community Church Rummage Sale is scheduled for October 25 and 26. Volunteers are needed to begin emptying the container and garage on Sunday October 20, with a particular need for volunteers after 12:30 pm that day (after other churches who share our space complete their worship services). Then, from Monday, Oct 21, through Thursday, October 24, we will need a full complement of volunteers all day to work as much as possible through the week to sort, test, price, display the goods, and to prepare for the opening day on Friday, October 25.

We consider this one of the most important mission projects of the ACC. It helps the community by keeping useable items out of the landfill and giveing them new life in someone else's home. It also helps to provide clothing and other essentials to individuals at true bargain prices. Many families depend on this rummage sale every year to help them make ends meet in an increasingly challenging economy. So, I encourage you to help your community and help your church this October by volunteering as many hours as possible during the week of October 20 through 26.

Trained League speakers will discuss all state and local ballot measures – what they will do, how they change existing law, who benefits, how much they cost and who pays for them, who supports/opposes them. There will be time for Q & A following the presentation.



The Cabinet thought you may want to know some of the items we discussed at our monthly Cabinet meeting. Here is a short summary of our September 15 meeting.

The Cabinet met on September 15 after skipping a meeting in August. Typically, church activities slow down during the hot summer months so we did not meet in August. It was to be Pastor Kyle's first meeting, but he was out with Covid. Despite the slow summer months, the budget remains in the black, with expenses of \$11,546.00 and expenses of 9928.51.

The Cabinet discussed concerns with the vandalism that has occurred to the Blessing Box in the front of the church. Three weeks ago someone smeared peanut butter all over the inside of the box. Then, last week, someone smeared the inside of the box with olive oil. We discussed shutting the box down for a couple of weeks, but our faithful Cheryl Traverse, who checks and maintains the box every day, wanted to continue this ministry to our community. Cheryl noted, "People come every day to get food out of the box. We are helping so many in need with this ministry. We can't stop for any time." Cheryl cleaned out the box after both acts of vandalism. The cabinet reported the vandalism to the Sheriff's office and they are patrolling the church twice a day. Also, it appears that someone in the apartments across the street also reported seeing people about the box. We do make a difference!

Sandy Lusink reported that the Deacons had a productive meeting and discussed plans for Rummage Sale, Thanksgiving baskets and Christmas. The next few months are their busiest season.

The Guild started their year off with a bang! First, Judy Smazel reported they delivered two trunk loads of personal products to East County Transitional Living, who were grateful for the help. She came from the Guild Bake Sale where all the items sold and was a big success for their giving. Judy is awed by the generosity and support of the congregation.

The rest of the meeting was devoted to discussing plans for the upcoming Rummage Sale, which is just around the corner, on October 25-26. Set up begins on the afternoon of October 20 and continues all week. Get ready! We need the support of all members!

That's the news from the Cabinet! Our next meeting is October 13, a week earlier than usual to accommodate the Rummage Sale. (Remember anyone is free to attend a Cabinet meeting. It happens right after church, about 10:15 a.m.)
