What Is Advent?

Advent is a four-week season in the Church calendar dedicated to anticipating the arrival, or "advent," of Jesus of Nazareth, the awaited Messiah and King. Christians from many backgrounds celebrate this time with reflections on hope, peace, love, and joy while their practices may look different, all focus on the hope-filled arrival of Jesus.

What Does Advent Mean?

Advent means "arrival" and signifies the start of an event or the arrival of a person. In Christian communities around the world, A refers to a four-week season of remembering and celebrating the arrival of Jesus on Earth. It's a time to reflect on the unexpected of Jesus' humble birth and join in the anticipation of when he will come again to reunite Heaven and Earth once and for all.

Why Is Advent Important?

Advent can be a simple and fun tradition of counting down to Christmas. But for others—particularly those who believe Jesus to incarnation of God and the long-awaited Messiah—Advent is a shared experience of meditation and prayer that celebrates the a Jesus.

Message from the Interim Designated Term Pastor



The end-of-the-year holidays are often marked by mixed feelings for many people. I cannot deny the deep sense of joy I feel from recalling childhood Christmases with my grandparents, or watching my nieces and nephews tear open wrapping paper as they get to their gifts. But I also acknowledge the heavy hearts of those who are far away from their families, or whose relational connections have been challenged by deaths, disagreements, and all manner of despair. It is hard to sing "Joy to the World" when you don't feel any joy in **your** world. And it can be tough to be hopeful about a new year when the old year has worn you down.

The Christian church marks this time of the year through celebration of the birth of Jesus the Christ. This season, known as Advent, is a time of anticipation, preparation, and waiting. The circumstances of Jesus' birth remind us of how humble beginnings can lead to monumental ends. Christmas orients us toward the infant Jesus, who must be held and fed and cared for. This is a vulnerable position. Babies depend on adults for so much, and their lives rest in the hands of others. To think of Jesus as a baby reminds me of how we all begin - helpless, crying, and yearning.

Yet, we don't look down on babies for having needs. On the contrary, most people rush to attend to a baby's cries. Whether it's a bottle of milk, a diaper change, or just a gentle rocking, they make sure the baby is alright. We accept and understand the necessity of caring for those who need it most.

If you're reading this, you certainly are not an infant. But you know well enough what it means to be in need. And in the time of year where gathering and family and friendship are the focal points, the need for community and connection is all too clear. While a baby cries loudly and passionately, many cry out in silence from unspoken pain.

I imagine that we will encounter more than a few people suffering in silence. Rather than anticipating the birth of Jesus, some are anticipating and preparing for loneliness and heartache. Amid a time of celebration, let us not forget to sit with those for whom the season is heavy. No, we don't have all the answers. There is no magical cure for the soul's weariness. But we can exercise our gifts of presence and patience. May we be as swift to respond to those burdens as we would to a crying baby. And may those measures of care be the spark that reignites someone's joy and hope.

The Board of Education would like to find some craft projects that our kids can do in Sunday School. If you have any ideas, please see Suzy, Betty Sopfe, or Pam Price.


