### Message from the Interim Designated Term Pastor



One of my favorite Broadway musicals, *Rent*, has a theme song that has become a classic. The song, "Seasons of Love," asks how we measure a year. Literally, we could measure it in 365 days, or 525,600 minutes. But the song ultimately asserts that we should measure it in *love*.

With every passing year, I find myself reflecting on just how much has happened. It it easy to lose track of events and people in the never-ending shuffle of life. The gift of reflection is that it allows

us to slow down and take stock of what we have felt and experienced. If I am honest, 2024 was a year of beautiful beginnings and difficult endings, hard losses and glorious gains. Life is not a uniform fabric; it is a patchwork quilt of varied questions, answers, and ambiguities.

As we gaze upon the quilt that is life, sometimes we will see patterns emerge. Perhaps we see the threads of friendships that have endured changes. Or the goals we set that came to fruition. Others might see that when unexpected struggles could have made them fall apart, their community held them together. For me, the theme that has been the strongest is love - love that binds us together and fills us with hope and calms our fears.

It's love that causes us to feel the sorrow of a family member's demise. It's love that fills us with joy as we celebrate the accomplishments of friends. It's love that draws us together for meals and guild meetings and Sunday morning worship. I think love is a powerful way to measure a year. It is a reminder that we can still choose to seek the best for one another, and that we are strengthened through the choice to show up for each other with care and concern.

I am not much of a New Year's Resolution person. It has been said that "most people overestimate what they can achieve in a year and underestimate what they can achieve in ten years." And so I don't worry too much about what I think *needs to be done* in a year. But I will say this - love is both a short-term goal and a long-term project. And as the calendar turns to a new month and year, I'm less concerned about counting my goals and more concerned about living in love.

However you measured the year that was 2024, I invite you to measure the moments of love and to see how they change and transform us in ways that mere resolutions cannot. We've got 525,600 minutes ahead - let's fill them with all the love we can.

### Message from the Moderator....



I begin this column with a very short history quiz. One question only: "Does anyone remember Y2K?" Y2K is an abbreviation for Year 2000. The tabloids were full of all kinds of gloom and doom predictions for the "turn of the century", but there was one prediction that had to be taken seriously. There was a real possibility that multiple computer systems would fail because the system programs would not recognize the last two digits of the year '00 as the first year of the new century. Instead, the programs were set-up to assume the first two digits would always be 19. So, at 12:01 am, on January 1, 2000, our computer dependent world waited anxiously to see if the

programmers were able to fix the problem to recognize 00 as the year 2000 (Y2K) or if we would revert to 1900. In hindsight, we know that the programs were, with a very few exceptions, corrected to recognize the birth of a new century. Although this may have seemed like a *Tempest in a Teapot*, with almost no serious consequences, it was only because of the hard work and uncounted hours spent by programmers who worked diligently to fix the problem before all systems failed.

Now, 25 years into the new century, at our little church in Alpine, CA, the lesson still rings true that the hard work of a team of dedicated people can have a big impact on the world around us. When I look at membership statistics and demographic profiles, it appears that the good old days have come and gone. But when I look at what a small group of dedicated people can accomplish by working together, a much different story unfolds. When this church takes on a project, we all pitch in and achieve great things. Examples are endless but a few illustrate my point: the Alpine Rummage Sale benefits hundreds of families each year, the Angle Tree provides Christmas gifts to local children who might otherwise feel left out, the Blessing Box provides free food for persons in need, the Guild raises money to support an amazing array of local charities and the Deacons provide Thanksgiving baskets to hungry families during the holiday. There are many more examples of the generosity of this congregation in Alpine, but one thing is constant - that these mission projects and many more are all accomplished by volunteers willing to share their time, talents, and financial support to help others in our community. I conclude with a big *THANK YOU!* to all of you for all that you do!
