Message from the Interim Designated Term Pastor



As a long-time educator, May has always been a month of beginnings and endings. Students are preparing to graduate and complete a phase of their education, and they are also beginning new journeys – more schooling, their first full-time jobs, summer internships. There's a lot happening! Over the years, I have recognized that these times of transition can bring both a lot of joy and a lot of grief. Sometimes, these come at them same time.

Why grief? Because it can be difficult to come to the end of a time that seemed like it would just keep on going. For my students, 4 years in college

represents a large amount of time – that's about 20% of their entire lives at that point! It's a time where they have made friends, learned lessons, endured losses, and had some major victories. It is hard to leave a place where you have become comfortable and learned how to navigate the ins and outs. And having to become a novice all over again can be challenging. You master one level of life just to start over at the bottom.

But there's joy, too. Because even when they are comfortable in their college lives, they also yearn for something more. They are ready to stretch out and see what it's like to live on their own and work towards their passions. They are excited to shape their lives as adults with more responsibility and more autonomy. This is a blessing, too, because they get the opportunity to apply their learning and training in a new setting.

For all of us, transition can be a double-edged sword. Even when we are well past school graduations, we all are still matriculating through life. Sometimes transition looks like leaving the job you've worked for years, or selling the house that you've called a home. Sometimes it looks like saying goodbye to a community and moving far away to start fresh. Other times, it looks like coming to terms with how our bodies don't work the way they used to work. Whatever the case may be, there can be a mixture of joy and grief as we accept that things will never be **exactly** like they used to be, even if new things can eventually be good.

As we proceed through the Eastertide season, I am reminded of how the disciples of Jesus had to come to terms with a world that would never be the same. Jesus had taught them well and journeyed with them, but they had to prepare to lead and teach without him. The joy of seeing him resurrected mingled with the grief of knowing he would soon depart. May we take comfort in knowing that God remains with us in every transition, and that our joys and our griefs each have a place in our whole humanity.
