When people ask me if I miss anything about the East Coast, where I lived for many years, the one thing that comes up for me is the autumn leaves. Cabinet Doings


The Cabinet met on Sunday, Sept. 21. The big item under discussion was Rummage Sale – more on that later.

DARYNA IS AMONG HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF CHILDREN TO RECEIVE OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD BOXES IN UKRAINE.

Daryna's story:

Daryna's parents, Dmitro* and his wife Alina*, fled Kharkiv with their two girls early in the war, spending five days in a bomb shelter in central Ukraine. "We left Kharkiv because of the kids," Dmitro said. Kharkiv, Ukraine's second largest city, was under heavy attack from Russian forces for weeks. In March 2022, Alina and the girls traveled to Slovakia, while Dmitro moved to Lviv. In September last year, the family reunited with him in western Ukraine where they found refuge in a welcoming church. For a little girl, Daryna's life has been far from normal. Much had been left behind and lost. And for this little girl, there had been little joy for quite a long time.

Yet, a little shoebox full of simple gifts lifted Daryna's spirit and put a smile on her face! Thousands of churches across Ukraine are helping displaced children like Daryna and are distributing nearly 400,000 shoeboxes this year, each filled with a variety of gifts including clothes, toys, school supplies, hygiene items, and other goodies. At festive outreach events, the children receive their gift-filled boxes and hear an age-appropriate presentation of the Gospel in their language. They are also invited to a follow-up discipleship course called The Greatest Journey. As a result, many of the children and their parents now call Jesus their Lord and Savior. Your gift of a little shoebox filled with love can help deliver great joy and the Good News of Jesus Christ!

Operation Christmas Child begins October 26th. Pick up your boxes at church. Then go shopping (or fill your box online!) Lovingly pack your gifts and say a prayer for the child that will receive your box. **Return all shoeboxes to the narthex by the end of service November 16**th **so** they can start their journey. The children thank you!
